**OMAR IBRAHIMI, MD, PhD**

Dr. Omar Ibrahim is the medical director of the Connecticut Skin Institute. He completed his Dermatology training at Harvard Medical School and a fellowship program in Mohs and Reconstructive Surgery, Laser and Cosmetic Surgery at the University of California – Davis. He is well known nationally having been an invited speaker at numerous national meetings, and written extensively about Mohs Surgery, Laser and Cosmetic Procedures. Dr. Ibrahim has published over 65 research articles and book chapters on skin cancer surgery, laser and cosmetic procedures in leading medical journals. He has also performed thousands of cases of Mohs Surgery and Laser and Cosmetic procedures. Dr. Ibrahim previously served as a Visiting Assistant Professor of Dermatology at Harvard Medical School in the Wellman Center for Photomedicine. The Wellman Center for Photomedicine is the world's leading research center where the majority of today's laser and cosmetic technologies were invented and tested. He is an active participant in many clinical trials of new technologies.

**MATTHEW C. KATZ**

Matthew C. Katz has been the executive vice president and chief executive officer of the Connecticut State Medical Society, the state's largest physician organization, since 2006. Katz is the former director of Private Payer Advocacy and director of the Practice Management Center at the American Medical Association, where he also worked in the Private Sector Advocacy unit and health policy development. Prior to his arrival at the AMA in 1998, Katz worked in the Department of Managed Care at Northwestern Memorial Hospital. Previously, Katz worked for the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), Medica Health Plans of Allina Health System and UnitedHealth Group, Inc.

A native of Minnesota, Katz received a fellowship and earned his Master of Science in Health Services Research and Policy from the Institute for Health Services Research and Policy at the University of Minnesota School of Public Health. Katz holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin - Madison. He has been awarded lifetime member status in the Chicago Health Executives Forum, where Katz is a past president. He sits on the boards of the Physician Advocacy Institute, the American Association of Medical Society Executives and HealthyCT, a not-for-profit organization that has received federal funding as a health insurance CO-OP under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

**JOYCE A. LAGNESE, JD**

Ms. Lagnese is one of the founding principals of the Hartford Law firm of DanaherLagnese, PC, where she serves as head of the Medical Malpractice Defense Unit. She is a high honors graduate from the State University of New York and obtained her law degree with honors in 1980 from Hofstra University School of Law. Her practice concentration is high exposure medical practice defense litigation. For over three decades, she has defended medical malpractice cases throughout Connecticut on behalf of physicians from every medical specialty, and has successfully tried to verdict a large number of medical malpractice cases including claims of wrongful death and permanent injury. Her practice also includes representation of medical practitioners and institutions in administrative proceedings before the Connecticut Department of Public Health.

Ms. Lagnese has been an invited lecturer and Keynote Speaker to various local and regional medical societies, physicians organizations and hospitals on medico-legal topics and is co-author of a textbook on Connecticut Medical Malpractice. She has also been an advocate in the Connecticut State Legislature for malpractice tort reform.

ALICIA LITTLE, MD, PhD

Dr. Little received her M.D. and Ph.D degrees from Yale University School of Medicine. In her dissertation research, she investigated the molecular mechanism of V(D)J recombination, the process by which individual T- and B-cell immune receptors are created. She spent her intern year training at Yale New Haven Hospital, and she is currently a second year dermatology resident at the Yale University School of Medicine.

**VINOD NAMBU DIRI, MD MBA**

Dr. Nambudiri serves as an attending physician in dermatology at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, MA. He completed his training in both internal medicine and dermatology at Brigham and Women's Hospital and the Harvard Combined Dermatology Program. His clinical interests are in complex medical dermatology, cutaneous oncology. His research interests are in understanding quality and cost within dermatology as well as the broader implications of health policy on dermatologic practice.

KELLY GILBERT RASKAUSKAS

Kelly Gilbert Raskauskas is the Vice President of Communications for the Connecticut State Medical Society (CSMS). She also serves as the CSMS representative to the Connecticut Immunization Coalition and the Connecticut Department of Public Health Preparedness Advisory Committee. Prior to CSMS, Ms. Raskauskas oversaw member and provider communications for a multistate Medicaid managed care organization. She also worked as a communications consultant specializing in non-profits, and served as press secretary for municipal, county and Congressional political campaigns. Ms. Raskauskas holds a Master's degree in Public Policy from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government, and is a Fellow of the AHIP Academy for Healthcare Management (FAHM).

**CHRYSLYN D. SCHMULTS, M.D., MSCE**

Dr. Schmults, is Director of the Mohs and Dermatologic Surgery Center at DanaFarber/Brigham and Women's Cancer Center and is an Associate Professor of Dermatology at Harvard Medical School. She completed her medical degree at Yale University and dermatology residency at New York University. She is a fellowship-trained Mohs surgeon. Dr. Schmults received a Master of Science in Clinical Epidemiology at the University of Pennsylvania. She has served on the board of directors of the American College of Mohs Surgery and on the American Joint Committee on Cancer (AJCC) cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma tumor staging taskforce. She founded the Dana-Farber/Brigham and Women's High-Risk Skin Cancer Clinic and oversees clinical trials for basal and squamous cell carcinomas.

**JENNIFER TAN, MD**

Dr. Tan is a graduate of the combined BA/MD program at Rutgers University and Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. Following medical school, Dr. Tan completed a residency in Dermatology at Harvard Medical School, where she served as Chief Resident before completing a fellowship in Pediatric Dermatology at Boston Children's Hospital. Dr. Tan spent 4 years on faculty at Harvard Medical School, where she joined the staff of both Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH) and Boston Children's Hospital (BCH). She served as Director of Pediatric Dermatology and Community Outreach at BWH while also actively participating in the inpatient service at BCH. Also during her time in Boston, Dr. Tan worked closely with faculty members to establish the Dermatology service at Boston Healthcare for the Homeless Program. For her community service efforts, she

was awarded a Members Making a Difference Award by the American Academy of Dermatology in 2012, the Faculty Development Pillar Award for Community Service in 2013 and the Faculty Clinical Community Service Award in 2014 by the Brigham and Women's Hospital Physician's Organization. After spending the past 2 years in private practice, she is currently transitioning back to a career in academics.

MATTHEW VESELY, MD, PhD

Dr. Vesely received his M.D. and Ph.D degrees from Washington University in St. Louis School of Medicine. His doctoral thesis focused on the mechanisms of immune mediated detection and eradication of cancer. After training at Barnes-Jewish Hospital at Washington University in St. Louis School of Medicine for intern year, he started his dermatology residency training at Yale School of Medicine where he is a current 3rd-year resident.

General Instructions

Section references are to the Internal Revenue Code unless otherwise noted.

Future developments. Information about developments affecting Form W-9 (such as legislation enacted after we release it) is at www.irs.gov/w9.

Purpose of Form

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)
- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)
- Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)

- Form 1095 (home mortgage interest), 1095-E (student loan interest), 1095-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)
