Sean Christensen, MD, PhD, is an Assistant Professor of Dermatology at the Yale University School of Medicine. Dr. Christensen completed his medical and PhD training in Immunobiology at Yale, where he helped define the role of Tolllike receptors in stimulating autoantibody production in systemic lupus. He then shifted his focus to cancer biology and clinical cutaneous oncology, completing a Mohs Surgery fellowship at Yale in 2012. His referral-based clinical practice is limited to the management of skin cancer, including Mohs surgery, treatment of early stage melanoma, and surgical reconstruction. In addition, Dr. Christensen focuses on complex skin cancer issues such as field cancerization, preventive strategies in high risk patients, and management of advanced or aggressive non-melanoma skin cancer. He is Director of Resident Education in dermatologic surgery, Associate Director of the ACGME Mohs Surgery and Cutaneous Oncology fellowship at Yale, and Director of Dermatologic Surgery at Yale Dermatology Branford.

Current research projects include defining the molecular and genetic changes that precede skin cancer development and optimizing field treatment strategies to decrease the risk of subsequent skin cancer. Dr. Christensen, an expert in this evolving area, has published and lectured nationally, including a popular forum at the Annual Meeting of the American Academy of Dermatology. He is currently initiating a clinical trial of a novel topical therapy for basal cell carcinoma.



Jeremy Moss, MD, PhD is in private practice in Bridgeport at Brookside Dermatology Associates. He received his MD PhD at NYU and then went to Yale for residency and fellowship. He specializes in medical and referral-based dermatology. Dr. Moss is a principal investigator for a number of FDA studies on new and emerging therapeutics for cutaneous diseases. He frequently lectures locally and nationally on a variety of dermatologic subjects. He has served on several different committees and boards for the American Academy of Dermatology and for the three different local hospitals he maintains affiliations with.



Mary Tomayko, MD, PhD is a physician scientist who specializes in the diagnosis and treatment of autoimmune blistering disease and other immune-mediated skin disease. Dr. Tomayko directs the Yale Immunobullous Clinic. She received her M.D. degree from the Univ of Penn School of Medicine, completed her residency and postdoctoral fellowship at Yale University and was Board Certified in 205. Dr. Tomayko is an attending physician at Yale Dermatology Associates, Yale-New Haven Hospital and Yale Health.

Dr. Tomayko's research laboratory has 2 intertwined missions. The first is to undercover the underlying mechanism of immune dysregulation in bullous pemphigoid, in order to develop targeted, effective and safer treatments for this autoimmune blistering disease. The second is to understand how long-lasting immunity to infection and immunization is established and maintained. In seminal work, she has uncovered unexpected diversity in phenotype and function of the cells that maintain B lymphocyte immunity and has identified novel

molecular pathways essential for lasting immunity. This work, funded by the National Institute of Health, suggests exciting new approaches to enhance and suppress immunity therapeutically. Dr. Tomayko publishes peer-reviewed articles and chapters and regularly presents her work at national and international meetings. She is a reviewer for scientific and medical journals and foundations. She is a Medical Editor for Dermatology Focus, a publication that highlights recent advances in the field.

Dr. Tomayko is a director of dermatology education at Yale University School of Medicine. She mentors undergraduate, graduate and medical students in her laboratory, and trains resident physicians and fellows.
