#### Omar Ibrahimi, M.D.

Dr. Omar Ibrahimi is the medical director of the Connecticut Skin Institute. He completed his Dermatology training at Harvard Medical School and a fellowship program in Mohs and Reconstructive Surgery, Laser and Cosmetic Surgery at the University of California – Davis. He is well known nationally having been an invited speaker at numerous national meetings, and written extensively about Mohs Surgery, Laser and Cosmetic Procedures. Dr. Ibrahimi has published over 65 research articles and book chapters on skin cancer surgery, laser and cosmetic procedures in leading medical journals. He has also performed thousands of cases of Mohs Surgery and Laser and Cosmetic procedures. Dr. Ibrahimi previously served as a Visiting Assistant Professor of Dermatology at Harvard Medical School in the Wellman Center for Photomedicine. The Wellman Center

for Photomedicine is the world's leading research center where the majority of today's laser and cosmetic technologies were invented and tested. He is an active participant in many clinical trials of new technologies.

#### Jane M. Grant-Kels, M.D., FAAD

Dr. Grant-Kels is Vice Chair of the Department of Dermatology, Associate Director of the UConn Dermatology Residency Program, Founding Director of the Cutaneous Oncology Center and Melanoma Programs, and Professor of Dermatology, Pathology and Pediatrics at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. Jane is the founding Chair of the Department of Dermatology at the University of Connecticut, which she led from 1979-2015. She is also the founding Director of the Dermatology Residency Program and the founding Director of the Dermatopathology Laboratory at UConn. She is also Adjunct Professor of Dermatology at the University of Florida. Dr. Grant-Kels attended Smith College and Cornell University

Medical College. She then trained in pediatrics and dermatology at Cornell's New York Hospital. Following her residency, she completed a dermatopathology fellowship at New York University with Dr. A Bernard Ackerman. Jane serves on numerous editorial boards related to her field and was the founding Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Clinical Medicine and the founding Co-Editor-in-Chief of the International Journal of Women's Dermatology. Presently she is Deputy Editor of the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology and Associate Editor for Dermatology for the Annals of Medicine. She has been elected to be a board member to the following boards: Women's Dermatologic Society Board, Association of Professors of Dermatology Board and American Academy of Dermatology Board of Directors. She was Vice President of the AAD from March 2019 until March 2020. She was the recipient of the Women's Dermatologic Society Rose Hirschler Award in 2018, the AAD Professionalism Award in 2014, as well as AAD Presidential Citations in 2016, 2017 and 2021. The 2021 AAD Presidential citation referred to Jane as "the American Academy of Dermatology's own Ruth Bader Ginsberg, creative and kind". She has also been recently notified that she will be honored by The American Society of Dermatopathology as she has been named the recipient of the 2022 Elson B. Helwig Memorial Lectureship for the 59th ASDP annual meeting. Her areas of interest are pigmented lesions, reflectance confocal microscopy, dermoscopy and dermatoethics. She has published over 400 peer reviewed manuscripts, over 151 chapters, guest edited 22 journals, and edited or co-authored 8 books. She has also delivered over 830 invited lectures. She has been married for over 47 years, has two children and five grandchildren.



#### BRETT KING, M.D.

Dr. King is Associate Professor of Yale Dermatology, specializing in skin diseases recalcitrant to first-line therapies. He has pioneered the use of Janus kinase (JAK) inhibitors in cutaneous diseases, in particular for alopecia areata, vitiligo, atopic dermatitis, granuloma annulare, sarcoidosis, and erosive lichen planus, in addition to other disorders. Dr. King received his B.A. at the University of California at Santa Cruz, his Ph.D. from Stanford University and his M.D. from Yale University School of Medicine. He completed medical internship at Massachusetts General Hospital and dermatology residency and fellowship at Yale University School of Medicine.

Dr. King is an investigator in numerous clinical trials. He lectures nationally and internationally and publishes extensively.



#### MARK RUSSI, M.D.

Dr. Russi is a professor of medicine at the Yale Medical School. He graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth College in 1984, was a Fulbright Scholar, earned his medical degree from the University of California San Francisco, and his public health degree from Yale. He completed both internal medicine residency and occupational and environmental medicine fellowship at Yale, joining the faculty in 1993. He is interested in the occupational medicine of healthcare workers and is active nationally in both guidance development and educational programs to enhance the safety of medical centers. Dr. Russi teaches in several courses at Yale, attends on the internal medicine inpatient service, and directs Occupational Health Services at Yale New Ha-

ven Hospital.



#### Nazanin Saedi, M.D.

Dr. Nazanin Saedi, is the Department Co-Chair of our Laser and Aesthetics Surgery Center. She graduated cum laude from Princeton University with an A.B in Anthropology. She attended The George Washington University School of Medicine, where she graduated with distinction and was elected to the Alpha Omega Alpha medical society. She subsequently completed her residency at the University of California, Irvine where she served as chief resident. Upon completing residency, she completed a fellowship in Cosmetic Dermatology and Dermatologic Surgery at SkinCare Physicians in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts. After fellowship, she served on faculty at Thomas Jefferson University for 9 years as Co-Director of Cutaneous Surgery and Direc-

tor of Laser Surgery and Cosmetic Dermatology. She continues to serve as volunteer faculty in the Department of Dermatology at Thomas Jefferson University.
